Funding

Census data guides the allocation of roughly \$675 billion in federal funding to local communities.

Representation

Census data determines the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives as well as establishes districts for state governments.

Business

Businesses use census data to select locations for facilities, recruit employees, and conduct market research.

Planning

Census data helps communities plan roads, schools, hospitals, senior centers, and emergency services.



For every one person not counted Kansas loses \$2,082 annually over ten years.

If a family of four goes uncounted, over a decade Kansas loses \$83,280.

Meaning that for every four person family not counted, the State loses \$832,800 in federal funding during this census period.
